### **Snow Fort Engineering Reaches New Heights**

With snow just right for packing, John gave the tip that kids could fill a bin, tamp down the snow, and then flip it as if making a sandcastle. With that hint, students were off and running to find the old milk crate out in the woods.

The milk crate technique turned out to be a huge success! Students made dozens of snow blocks and stacked them up to build fortress walls reaching new heights. More forts are sprouting up all over campus as the children experiment, plan, design, and engineer. The creativity and ingenuity is endless!

#### Jacob's Art Goal: Hokusai's Wood Prints

"For my art goal, I chose to study about Hokusai. I did wood prints. First, we had to draw it out on the wood. I drew a J. Then I carved it out. One technique was to hit the carving tool on the end to dig into the wood. Another technique was to push it in and twist it. The other way was just pushing it.

Next, we rolled the paint on it. My first color was red. Then we put paper on the painted wood block. We pushed the paper on using a roller to roll it. Then we pulled the paper off.



Hokusai had to do probably three or four different carvings for the different colors. I think I learned a lot and I liked it because I really like doing wood carving"



### Reading & Writing Highlights

Inspired by reading the book *The Quiltmaker's Gift* by Jeff Brumbeau, Kathleen's Reading & Writing Group made their very own Kindness Quilt. In the book, a quiltmaker teaches a greedy king that kindness is the key to true happiness. Students reflected on how acts of kindness can make a difference in people's lives. Each of the quilt squares is uniquely beautiful and together they create a thought provoking work of art.

Meanwhile, the Walden students are enjoying a literature highlight of the year — the Group Read of *The Pushcart War* by Jean Merrill. Students are having lively discussions as they examine the power dynamics between the pushcart vendors vs. the big trucking companies. They are making connections with the real world. Esme says, "It's really funny and has a lot of things like actual life that happen." Quentin reflects, "The Pushcart War is kind of like a spoof on real war." While most of the Walden Program focuses on supporting individual interests, the Group Read provides the opportunity for collaborative critical reading and analysis. Everyone makes the solemn promise: no peeking ahead!

### Learning Through Play: Skiing & Penguins

Heather has taught skiing since she was 14 years old. So when the snow conditions were just right, the Kindergarten classroom turned into a ski shop. Children played shoe store by matching up all the different ski boots and arranging them by size. They learned how bindings work and which ski boots



connect to which type of bindings. Next, the children headed out into the snow to give it a try. They loved it!



Kindergarteners have also been studying cold environments. The penguins of Antarctica have been a favorite topic. In fact, penguins inhabited the tub table— it was filled with water, penguin figurines, and foam trays as pack-ice. Children learn so much through hands-on play and here they were able to enact penguin behavior while also learning about balance and flotation.
